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CHAPTER 1 GENERAL

Article 1

CHAPTER 2 OPERATIONAL OBJECTIVES AND SCOPE

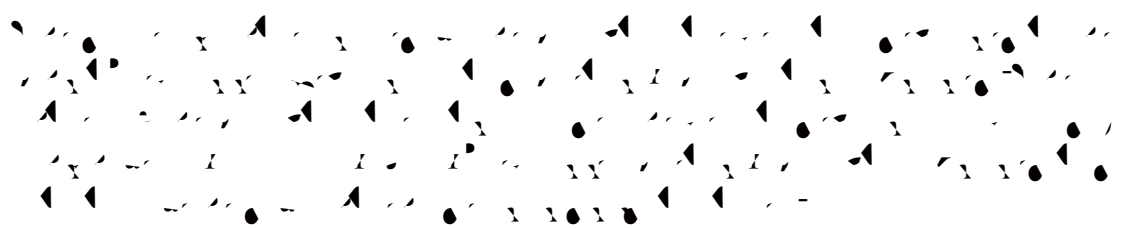

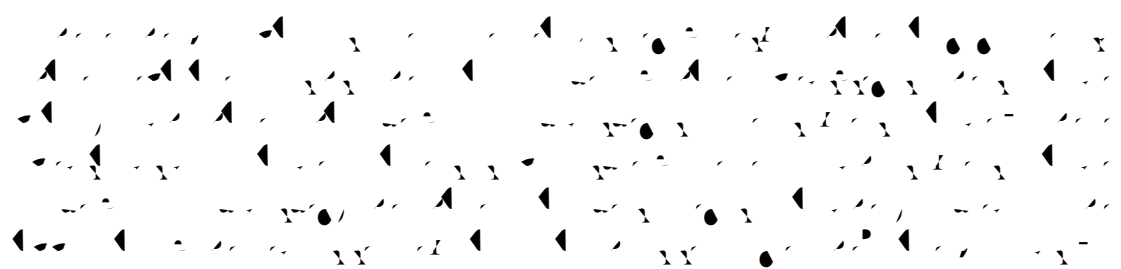

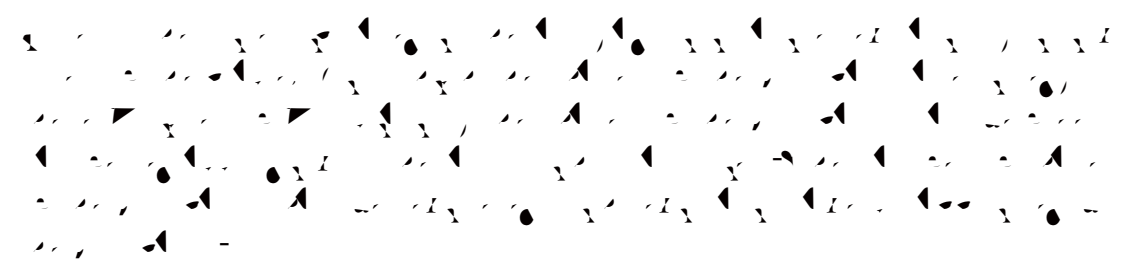

**CHAPTER 5 FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR PURCHASE
OF COMPANY SHARES**

Article 37 The Board of Directors may, at its discretion, make such financial assistance as it may think fit for the purpose of enabling any person to acquire shares in the Company, provided that the assistance is not given in contravention of the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956, and provided that the Board of Directors is satisfied that the person to whom the assistance is given is a bona fide person and is not a person who is disqualified from being a director of the Company.

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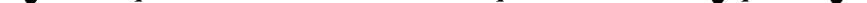

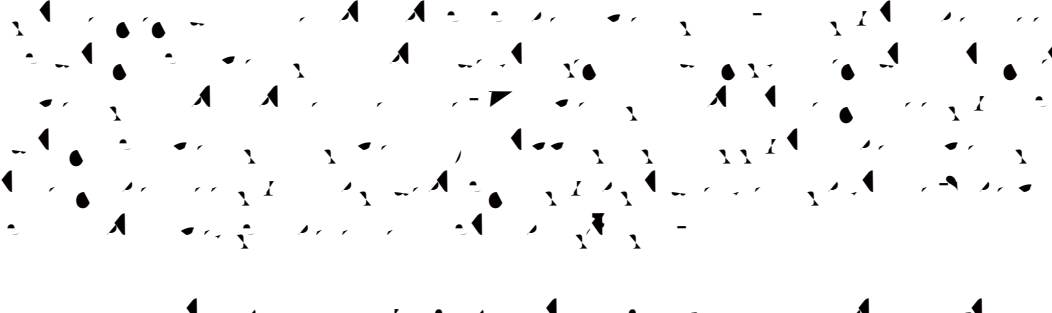
Figure 1. The effect of the number of trials on the number of correct responses. The number of correct responses was significantly higher than the number of incorrect responses in all cases.

CHAPTER 18 MERGER, DIVISION, DISSOLUTION AND LIQUIDATION

Section 1 Merger and Division

Article 222

1. The shareholders of a company may, by a special resolution, resolve to merge the company with another company or to divide the company into two or more companies, provided that the resolution is passed by a majority of three-fourths of the votes cast by the shareholders entitled to vote at the meeting.

2. The resolution must be accompanied by a report from the directors, stating the reasons for the proposed merger or division, and the terms and conditions of the proposed merger or division.

3. The resolution must also be accompanied by a report from the auditors, stating the results of their audit of the company's accounts for the year ending immediately before the date of the meeting.

4. The resolution must be passed at a meeting of the shareholders, at which the directors and auditors are present, and the resolution must be recorded in the minutes of the meeting.

5. The resolution must be approved by the Registrar of Companies, who may, if he thinks fit, require the directors to provide such further information as he may require.

Article 223

1. If a company resolves to merge with another company, the directors must, within a period of three months from the date of the resolution, cause the company to be merged with the other company, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution.

2. If a company resolves to divide into two or more companies, the directors must, within a period of three months from the date of the resolution, cause the company to be divided into two or more companies, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution.

3. The directors must, within a period of three months from the date of the resolution, cause the company to be merged with the other company, or to be divided into two or more companies, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution.

4. The directors must, within a period of three months from the date of the resolution, cause the company to be merged with the other company, or to be divided into two or more companies, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution.
